

◇ UUA President Offers Pastoral Message on the Election

Rev. Peter Morales, president of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), offered the following pastoral message as he reflects on the election:



"The election is finally over. Most of us are shocked, even horrified, by the results. We live in a nation whose deep divisions have been exposed. The wounds of this election will not heal soon. Many of us are emotionally exhausted and deeply offended by what we have experienced.

This is a time to take a deep breath and a long view. Our role as religious progressives committed to democracy, compassion and human dignity is to help bend our culture toward justice. Think of issues like

marriage equality and civil rights. The laws change when attitudes change. Our role is to help change attitudes, to lead by example.

Fear, anger, racism and xenophobia have created fertile ground for demagogues. Our voice is going to matter in the coming years. Our role, as always, will be to be a powerful voice for compassion and civil rights. Perhaps, at times, we may even be called upon to join with others to resist flagrant injustice.

For now, let us reflect and draw strength from one another. Together we can recover. Together we can shape the future."

◇ UUSC Statement on the Dakota Access Pipeline Standoff

The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee issued a statement on the standoff involving the Standing Rock Sioux. "The brutal treatment of protectors standing with the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe has escalated in the past few weeks. Today, we hear of militarized actions by law enforcement toward young and elderly men and women who have been peaceful and non-violent, and the inhumane detainment of people in kennels, like wild animals. These intimidation tactics are weapons of the oppressors aimed at drowning out our voices. We must not give up now.

UUSC supports UUA's call for action and we urge all of you to do the same. The oppressive nature and violent tactics of this development against the protectors calls for a radical response. If there is ever time for us to stand together in solidarity, it is now. Join the tribe in standing up for their rights as indigenous peoples to protect and preserve their water, their future and their culture. Below, our partners at the College of Social Justice have provided a number of ways you can show your support.



Over the last few months, many of us have been moved by following [the powerful movement of indigenous leaders defending sacred land](#), and the earth and water we all share, from the threat of the dangerous [Dakota Access Pipeline](#). In recent days, we have also watched with horror as our computer screens have increasingly filled

with images of brutal aggression against and mass arrests of the courageous Water Protectors leading the #NoDAPL encampments in Standing Rock, ND.

Whether you are in a position to travel to Standing Rock, to put pressure on decision-makers, or to donate to meet direct needs on the ground, [we hope you will find a way to take action](#), and to [ground your efforts in learning about](#) and reflection upon the history of colonialism and systemic oppression of First Nations that we see continuing today.

Our Unitarian Universalist faith teaches us that we are all inextricably and radically interdependent; that we are part of an interconnected web of existence that encompasses all creatures and the earth. Following those deeply held theological values, in 2012, the UUA General Assembly [passed a resolution repudiating the Doctrine of Discovery](#), calling UUs to work in solidarity with native communities and to make reparations for the impacts of colonization, genocide, land theft, and continuing harms perpetrated against indigenous peoples. If we are to follow through with our pledge, we must acknowledge that we are called to show up in solidarity with our indigenous kin to protect the earth that gives us life, and to resist the legacy of colonization and genocide of the native peoples on whose land we all live.

◆ **Reversing Inequality Conference**



UUs for a Just Economic Community (UUJEC) and UUs for Social Justice in the Capitol Region (UUSJ) are teaming up to host the "Reversing Inequality" conference in Washington, D.C. from April 3 to 5, 2017. During this conference, Unitarian Universalists will learn about policies that ensure corporations and the 1% pay their fair share. These policies will also provide more funding for better education, to address climate change, and offer more training for workers displaced by globalization. Conference participants will go to the offices of lawmakers to explain to our decision makers that more investment is needed in early education, in finding ways to reduce carbon emissions and to rebuild our crumbling infrastructure to create jobs. What to do if you are witnessing Islamophobic harassment
A bystander's guide to help the person who's being targeted

1 Engage conversation.
Go to them, sit beside them and say hello. Try to appear calm, collected and welcoming. **IGNORE THE ATTACKER.**

2 Pick a random subject and start discussing it.
It can be anything: a movie you liked, the weather, saying you like something they wear and asking where they got it...

3 Keep building the safe space.
Keep eye contact with them and don't acknowledge the attacker's presence: the absence of response from you two will push them to leave the area shortly.

4 Continue the conversation until the attacker leaves & escort them to a safe place if necessary.
Bring them to a neutral area where they can recollect themselves; respect their wishes if they tell you they're ok and just want to go.

Illustrations include: a bystander approaching a targeted woman; the bystander saying "HI, HOW ARE YOU?"; the bystander saying "THE WEATHER LATELY IS SO..."; the bystander saying "MY SISTER TOLD ME ABOUT THIS MOVIE"; the bystander saying "IRRELEVANT"; and the bystander and targeted woman walking away together.

◆ November 9, Anniversary of *Kristallnacht*



Five years after Adolf Hitler was elected Chancellor of Germany, the country took what might have been the final step into madness. In a 48-hour period, soldiers, paramilitary, and citizens destroyed or damaged 7,000 Jewish-owned business, 1,000 synagogues, and hundreds of homes. Hundreds of Jews were killed and thousands arrested and sent to concentration camps. *Kristallnacht* (The Night of Broken Glass) offered the German people one last chance to step back before jumping off the cliff of the unspeakable.

This article recounts the first-hand experience of 90 year old Henry Rosenthal, a Holocaust survivor. In this time when our American experience scarily mirrors that of 1933 Weimar Germany, this cautionary tale bears witness to the possible.

◆ Unitarian Universalist Refugee and Immigrant Services and Education

UURISE is a non-profit, 501(c)(3) organization incorporated in 2007 to empower immigrants and refugees in the U.S. by offering direct legal services, particularly to those who have few resources to obtain legal assistance. UURISE provides legal advice and representation to individual clients and extends services throughout the U.S. through the provision of workshops and trainings on immigration and advocacy. Through strategic partnerships, intensive coalition building and volunteer development, UURISE has crafted a method of extending legal services to large groups at no or nominal cost.

Retired Staff Sergeant Eric Alva was one of the first troops to be deployed for the start of Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2003 and the first American wounded in the war. Stepping on a landmine just hours after the ground war began, Alva became the war's first Purple Heart recipient.

After serving in the military for 13 years, Alva retired as a Staff Sergeant and returned to college. It was there that he took the momentous step of coming out as a gay man who had proudly served and sacrificed for his country.

As the national spokesperson for the Human Rights Campaign's effort to repeal the military's discriminatory "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy—which they were successful in helping put an end to in 2011—Alva is now a popular speaker on diversity in the workplace, speaking at organizations such as Johnson & Johnson, Toyota, Raytheon, AOL, Union Pacific Railroad, and NASA.

With a story of genuine courage, Alva continues to champion civil rights for all individuals and serves as a powerful role model for remaining true to one's self.
